

11 ARENA DI VERONA

Built around the 1st century A.D., this is a symbol of the city and the largest open-air opera house in the world. In an excellent state of preservation, what once was an ancient amphitheatre where gladiator shows took place is now used for operas and concerts. Every year since 1913 it has been hosting the famous Opera Festival. www.arena.it

2 CASA DI GIULIETTA

This is a tourist must-visit for all fans of William Shakespeare's tragedy "Romeo and Juliet" and their love affair. The 13th-century Gothic tower-house is located in Via Cappello, not far from Piazza delle Erbe: in the courtyard there is the bronze statue of Juliet (which according family, it is now a place of historical interest to tradition grants luck and love to the person that contains some of the most beautiful touching her breast) and the famous balcony described in Shakespeare's romantic tragedy. casadigiulietta.comune.verona.it

3 PIAZZA BRA

This is the largest square in Verona, overlooked by the famous Arena and a number of historic buildings, including Palazzo della Gran Guardia and Palazzo Barbieri. The characteristic "liston", a sidewalk paved in pink marble from Valpolicella, with which the Arena was also built, is the perfect place to enjoy a coffee or an aperitivo, perhaps just before attending a show inside the amphitheatre.

4 CASTELVECCHIO

This is one of Verona's main monuments and today houses the city's civic museum. Once the military seat of the Scaligeri works of art in the city, as well as being an architecturally interesting building. museodicastelvecchio.comune.verona.it

5 TORRE DEI LAMBERTI

With its 84 metres overlooking Piazza delle Erbe, Torre dei Lamberti (built in 1172) is one of the tallest buildings in Verona. The central section of this 12th-century tower is decorated with a large clock, while at the top are two bells, one of which strikes the hour. The top, which can be reached by lift or a spiral staircase, offers a spectacular view of the historic centre. www.torredeilamberti.it

6 DUOMO DI VERONA

The church of early Christian origins was consecrated in 1187 by Pope Urban II and is part of an architectural complex that includes other religious buildings (the church of Saint Helena, the church of San Giovanni in Fonte, the Canons' Cloister, the Canonical Museum and the Capitular library). The majestic and solemn interior of Romanesque design with Gothic touches on the façade contains

Renaissance trompe l'oeil frescoes and the famous painting "Assumption of the Virgin" by Titian (1535). www.cattedralediverona.it

7 BASILICA DI SAN ZENO

The church dedicated to Verona's patron saint has early Christian origins, it is a sacred place par excellence in the city and one of the masterpieces of Romanesque art in Italy. In the shape of a Latin cross with three naves, the interior is on three levels: the crypt, the church proper (or chiesa plebana) and the presbytery. Notable features on the façade are the central rose window, also known as the "Wheel of Fortune", and the bronze portal consisting of 48 panels. basilicasanzeno.it

8 PIAZZA DELLE ERBE

Verona's oldest square stands in the area of the Roman Forum, which for many centuries was the hub of the city's social, economical

and political life. Surrounded by palaces, towers and statues from different periods of history, among which the Torre dei Lamberti, it is considered one of the most characteristic squares in Italy. Every weekend a colourful fruit and vegetable market is held here: a typical meeting point of the Veronese.

9 PONTE PIETRA

It is the oldest of the seven bridges crossing the Adige River in the city and now the preferred transit route for those wishing to reach the Roman Theatre. Destroyed by the Germans in World War II, it was rebuilt with the rubble of the original bridge and retains the characteristic shape of donkey's back, typical of Roman bridges.

10 CASTEL SAN PIETRO

To admire the city from a different point of view, you can take a nice walk up to Castel

San Pietro (a funicular is also available). From the top of this hill, you can admire an enchanting panorama of Verona and the Adiae River.

U GIARDINO GIUSTI

Located in the historic centre of Verona, this garden created at the end of the 14th century is considered one of the most significant examples of Italian Renaissance gardens. An oasis of greenery just a few steps from the Arena, created as a backdrop for the Palazzo of the same name. A combination of nature, art and history that recalls many elements of the Medici gardens, an aesthetic reference point for the elite of the Renaissance. As the Grand Tour spread through Europe, the Giusti Garden became a stop for all the great travellers passing through Verona. giardinogiusti.com

The Gothic funerary complex in the heart of the historic centre houses the tombs of the most illustrious members of the Scala family, one of the richest and most powerful families in ancient Verona. Among them is the Ark of Cangrande, Lord of Verona from 1308 to 1311, street that connects the city's two most also known as the friend and protector of the great poet Dante Alighieri.

13 TEATRO ROMANO

The 1st century B.C. open-air theatre was built before the Arena of Verona and is among the oldest buildings in the city. Built on the natural slope of the San Pietro hill on the left bank of the Adige River, it was completely covered by buildings and dwellings after the end of the Roman era. Brought back to the surface at the end of the 19th century, it has been hosting musical concerts

and theatrical performances since 1948. museoarcheologico.comune.verona.it www.estateteatraleveronese.it

W VIA MAZZINI

Via Mazzini is a narrow cobbled pedestrian important squares: Piazza Bra and Piazza delle Erbe. About 500 metres long, it is considered the shopping street, with rows of modern speciality shops and boutiques of the most famous fashion brands. Together with Corso di Porta Borsari, Corso Sant'Anastasia, Piazza delle Erbe and Via Cappello, it forms a small shopping district.

15 PORTA BORSARI

One of the gates that opened along the Roman walls of Verona, it dates back to the first century AD and was the main

entrance to the city, being located along the axis of the decumanus (the main street in Roman times). In an excellent state of preservation, it is characterised by a white stone façade and an overall height of 13 metres, which also includes the upper defensive structure.

16 BASILICA DI SANTA ANASTASIA

The largest and most solemn Catholic church in Verona's historic centre is also the city's most important Gothic monument, preserving important works of art. Founded in 1290, its construction took over a century. The unfinished façade features a magnificent double portal with polychrome marble, reliefs and frescoes. Inside, the basilica has three large naves supported by 12 imposing columns of red Verona marble.

CASA MUSEO PALAZZO MAFFEI **HOUSE MUSEUM**

In a spectacular seventeenth-century building overlooking Piazza delle Erbe, the extraordinary art exhibition born from the collecting passion of the Veronese entrepreneur Luigi Carlon spans more than five centuries of history: a "wunderkammer" with ancient masterpieces in dialogue with the modernity of a private residence. The collection consists of over 350 works arranged in 20 rooms decorated with stuccoes and frescoes. palazzomaffeiverona.com

18 PIAZZA DEI SIGNORI

Also known as Piazza di Dante because of the statue dedicated to the Great Poet placed here in the 19th century, it is located near Piazza delle Erbe. Since the Middle Ages it

has had administrative and political functions and from an architectural point of view it is characterised by the succession of historic buildings connected by arcades and loggias.

19 PONTE SCALIGERO

Also known as Ponte di Castelvecchio, it was built in the middle of the 14th century at the request of Cangrande II della Scala. It has been described as "the most daring and admirable work of the Middle Ages in Verona", a masterpiece of military engineering: a robustness that has allowed it to cross five centuries of history and the harshest floods of the Adige River intact.

20 PALAZZO BARBIERI

Headquarters of Verona City Municipality, it is a neoclassical building constructed around the middle of the nineteenth century in Piazza

Bra. Characterized by a majestic façade, for an Austrian military barracks, it recalls a Roman temple in its forms. The Sala degli Arazzi and the Sala del Consiglio Comunale are noteworthy for their paintings and furnishings.

21 CASA DI ROMEO

A medieval building that belonged to the Montecchi family, now a private residence, it is characterised by an alternation of Romanesque, Gothic and Renaissance windows, surmounted by splendid battlements.

22 PORTA DEI LEONI

One of the gates that opened onto the city in Roman times (1st century BC), giving access to the cardo maximus, the city's most important road axis after the decumanus. It takes its name from a sarcophagus found nearby depicting a pair of lions.

- ___ Symbol of the city of Verona and the third largest Roman amphitheater in Italy, after those of Rome (the Colosseum) and Capua, the Arena of Verona was built around the middle of the first century AD to host gladiator fights, naval battles or shows with exotic animals.
- Since 1913, when **Giuseppe Verdi's "Aida"** was performed here for the first time, it has hosted a prestigious **opera festival** every summer. Attending an opera in the Arena is an experience that takes your breath away, thanks also to the perfect acoustics, due mainly to its particular elliptical shape, which allows the singers' voices and music to propagate perfectly inside, so as not to need amplification systems. Famous artists such as **Maria Callas, Luciano Pavarotti, Placido Domingo** have performed here.
- In recent years, moreover, the Arena is often the background to **musical concerts**, shows of various kinds, **sporting events**, such as the arrival of the Giro d'Italia or ice skating competitions, some of these broadcast on national TV.
- In Roman times the show took place in the center, with the audience all around, today instead the structure is used as a theater: one end hosts the stage, while the audience sits in a semicircle on the opposite side. Although in Roman times it originally had a capacity of 30,000 spectators, today it contains about half that number, both for stage requirements and for safety reasons.
- Architecturally, the appearance of this imposing amphitheater today is quite different from the original, especially because of the lack of the outer ring. The only part of the original monumental facade still standing is the so-called Ala (Wing), composed of four arches, which has become the most iconic image of the Arena today. In spite of the numerous transformations it has undergone, it is still one of the best-preserved Roman amphitheatres of the Peninsula, thanks to the systematic conservative restorations carried out since the sixteenth century.
- The Arena was built in stone from Valpolicella, the so-called Rosso Verona, a resistant and easy to extract limestone, with a special color that ranges from milky white to deep red. Walking through the long, semi-dark tunnels that run along the entire perimeter of the structure and coming out on the terraces, with the sudden glimpse of the inside of the amphitheater in all its majestic grandeur, is a unique emotion, which takes us back for a moment to the time of the gladiators and leaves us stunned in front of the Roman architectural genius.

EXHIBITIONS Palazzo Maffei is a house museum offering a journey through history among masterpieces and curiosities spanning two thousand years. TEATRO FILARMONICO, 24 FEBRUARY

► SYMPHONIC SEASON KICK-OFF

CONCERTS The 2023 Symphonic Season will kick off on 24 February and, alternating with opera dates, **will continue until 2 December. Twelve appointments** over the course of 2023 will feature the Chorus and Orchestra of the Fondazione Arena di Verona, flanked by internationally renowned conductors and soloists, many of them talented young people making their Verona debut

The Season will begin in the sign of **Gustav Mahler** with the famous "Fifth Symphony", to explore throughout the year concerts, serenades, overtures, suites, preludes, ballets by J. S. Bach, Bartók, Beethoven, F. J. Haydn, Mendelssohn, Milhaud, Mozart, Poulenc, Purcell, Rachmaninov, Saint-Saëns, Schubert, Schumann, Šostakovič, Richard Strauss, Stravinsky, often premiered at the Teatro Filarmonico.

There will be no lack of forays into **contemporary music**, with programmes including pieces by Berio, Bosso, Gulda, Pärt, as well as important appointments with symphonic-vocal music that will engage the Arenian Choir, such as Rossini's great "Messa di Gloria" or Fauré's "Requiem".

All concerts will be held on a **double date**, on Friday at 8pm and on Saturday at 5pm. In addition, the traditional "New Year's Eve Concert" on 31 December is confirmed to await the arrival of 2024 in a real celebration in music.

PIAZZALE OLIMPIA, 12 FEBRUARY

RUNNING THROUGH HISTORY

SPORT Running in Verona means travelling through history in one of Italy's most romantic cities of art. Verona will host also this year thousands of runners from dozens of countries around the world for the "Giulietta&Romeo Half Marathon".

This event is an **international competition** that in 2014 and 2020 hosted the Italian Championships. It has always been **one of the most participated races in Italy** with a certified route that touches the centre and many other areas of the city. Romeo and Juliet and their tragedy narrated by William Shakespeare has thus become **one of the most fascinating half marathons in Italy**: the Arena, the Adige River, Piazza delle Erbe, Juliet's House, Castelvecchio, Ponte Pietra, Porta Borsari and many others are the landmarks that can be admired in the city while **running (or walking)**.

Along with the 21km, awarded the Fidal Gold Label and in 2021 in second place in Italy in the ranking of the most participated half marathons, this year will be run concurrently with the half marathon the "Monument Run 10k": a 10km route (9.7km approx.), competitive and non-competitive race.

▼ NATURE ON SHOW

CONTEMPORARY ART Protagonist of the exhibition "Contemporary Non-Stop. The Breath of Nature" is this time WATER. A source of life but also a destructive element, the first of the four natural elements invites a number of contemporary artists to reflect on the theme of ecology, of man's relationship with nature, which in recent decades has been compromised by the effects of climate change. Thus continues the journey into the "natural forms" of art begun with the format launched in 2020, in which nature becomes a metaphor for creation, questions man and becomes a cue that translates into the great enigmatic nature of art. The exhibition is open from Tuesday to Sunday, from 11am to 7pm (last entrance at 6.30 pm).

>> ABOUT THE GAM GALLERIA D'ARTE MODERNA "ACHILLE FORTI"

The GAM is a modern art museum in the historic centre of Verona, housed in the Palazzo della Ragione. In fact it was founded by Veronese patron Achille Forti, who at the beginning of the 20th century left his art collection as a fund for the establishment of a city museum dedicated to the arts. This heritage has been enriched through bequests and donations until there are about 1,600 works of art, covering a period of time from the early nineteenth century to the present day.

At the end of 2021 it inaugurated a new exhibition itinerary, the result of artistic research aimed at modernity: an exhibition structured according to the formula of the rotation of works, which aims to make known most of the works kept in the deposits, some of which have never been exhibited. The Gallery tells the story of the development of art in Italy from 1830 to the present day, and proposes new itineraries on the themes and insights that have marked the cultural landscape of this time period.

Since 1997, the museums has enriched the contemporary section with about 400 works, thanks to purchases, donations, deposits and loans, with the aim of offering the public already established authors on the international art scene, as well as young emerging artists.

An award-winning flowering season fascinates the public with many varieties and novelties not to be missed: in particular, more than one million tulips, in more than 300 varieties including early, medium and late bloomers, colour the lawns, woods and bodies of water of the Park, for an unforgettable colour show.

■ ANIMALS IN THE ANCIENT WORLD

ART The exhibition aims to illustrate some

aspects of the fascinating subject of animals in the ancient world, presenting not only objects that are not normally on public display, but also dedicating a showcase to a very interesting find that took place in recent years in Verona. The exhibition starts with some small but valuable evidence of the role of animals in ancient Egypt, in particular the use of mummies of different species as offerings to the gods in places of worship. The documentation on the **classical** world, in which animals played an important role in mythology and religion, is more extensive. The exhibition closes with **illustrations of** fantastic creatures, frequently depicted in the ancient world, and with a section devoted to the fascination these beings exerted in the ages following antiquity.

VENICE, 4-21 FEBRUARY

LET THE PARTY BEGIN!

TRADITIONS Carnival in Venice is one of the most eagerly-awaited events both in Italy and abroad. An extravaganza lasting for more than two weeks, during which the Lagoon city is transformed into one large performance amidst masks, balls, prizes and presentations. The most important days of the Venetian Carnival are Giovedì grasso (Fat Thursday) and Martedì grasso (Shrove Tuesday), even though visitor attendance reaches its peak at the weekends. This festival has ancient origins and is associated with the spirit and personality of Venice. This year, celebrations kick off on Saturday 4 February, and end on Tuesday 21 February. The 2023's theme will be "Take your time for the original sign" and Venice will experience a widespread celebration in the city's campi, piazzas, calli and streets, with the Arsenale still the protagonist of a grand **spectacle on the** water and the return of the masked float parades on the mainland and islands. Although when one speaks of Carnival everyone immediately thinks of Venice, one must not forget that there are **other cities in the Veneto region** that have ancient and evocative traditions linked to these festivities about half an hour from Verona: just think of the **Carnival of Arzignano** on Saturday 25 February and the Carnival of Schio from 22 to 23 February.

Surrounded by three distinct regions -Lombardy, Trentino Alto-Adige and the Veneto – Italy's largest lake is one of the most Gothic style, and Villa Albertini surrounded important tourist destinations in the country. Characterized by a mild climate all year round, Mediterranean vegetation, colours and scents reminiscent of the sea, Lake Garda is surrounded by **picturesque villages**, seaside resorts, historical remains, harbours, parks and nature reserves: capable of satisfying nature lovers, those who want to discover places rich in history and culture, as well as the more sporty who can enjoy trekking, excursions and above all, thanks to the constant winds, water sports.

The most famous places include Sirmione, the favourite destination of the poet Catullus and Maria Callas, with its splendid Rocca Scaligera, Gardone Riviera, with the Vittoriale degli Italiani, the house-museum of the poet Gabriele D'Annunzio, Peschiera del Garda, with its fortress and 16th-century ramparts. Not far from Verona, we find Bardolino, a very lively centre with its typical maze of alleyways, shops, bars, restaurants and nightclubs, and **Garda**, where it is worth visiting the Pieve di Santa Maria in Garda, one of the oldest religious buildings in the area, which has a beautiful 15th-century cloister and some 15th-century frescoes.

Lovers of architecture should not miss the famous Garda villas, including the 16th-century Villa Guarienti, which stands at the centre of

the San Vigilio promontory, with its Italian-style garden and lemon house built in Venetian by an immense park stretching across the hill behind it, in a riot of Mediterranean fauna. History and archaeology enthusiasts should not miss the rock engravings in the **Torri del Benaco** area. Engraved on a rock that has become a sort of natural blackboard due to glaciation, you will find graffiti from various eras, mostly dating back to prehistoric times.

The area is also characterised by the production of excellent wine and olive oil. Custodian of extraordinary culinary and

enogastronomic excellence, Garda is the production area of red radicchio, rice of the vialone nano variety, Lessinia cheeses, fish and Garda oil, and even pandoro and Amarone della Valpolicella, all typical products capable of satisfying even the most demanding traveller.

The nearby Gardaland, one of Italy's largest amusement parks, boasts several of the country's most famous attractions, including roller coasters, simulators and theme parks designed to appeal to visitors of all ages (www.gardaland.it).

THE NATURAL PARK **OF MONTE BALDO**

t dominates Lake Garda and is the ideal place for a holiday in contact with nature and good food. We are talking about **Monte Baldo**, a mountair which offers a 360° panorama of the lake (don't Baldo rotating cable car.



Tax Free Refund Guide

According to the Italian law, non-EU resident travellers may be granted VAT relief/refund for goods intended for personal or family use purchased in Italy. This relief is surely an advantage for the foreign travellers: in fact, it allows to save from a minimum of 4% up to a maximum of 22% of the selling price of the goods purchased. Here is a short guide according to the Italian legislation to discover the common system of value added tax exclusively for non-EU resident travellers.

- VAT (in Italian: IVA) is a **value added tax** on goods and services, and is part of the European Union's value added tax system.
- In some cases, travellers may be granted a VAT refund.
 This refund does not cover the services supplied by hotels, restaurants, taxis or agencies.
- 3. You may be eligible for a VAT refund provided that:
- you are a non-EU resident;
- the goods purchased are intended for personal or family use only and are carried in your luggage;
- the overall value of the goods purchased exceeds 154,94
 Euro (VAT included);
- the purchase is certified by an invoice. This invoice should include a description of the goods purchased, your personal information as well as the details of your passport or any other equivalent document;

- the goods shall leave the EU territory by the third month following the date of issue of the invoice, as proved by the "customs stamp";
- from 1 September 2018, tax free invoices in Italy must be electronically transmitted by the national seller to OTELLO information system (Online Tax Refund at Exit: Light Lane Optimization) and their validation is digitally carried out.
- after the digital "customs stamp" is obtained, OTELLO will send a message to the retailer that all the requirements are met and, as a consequence, the retailer will reimburse the amount due or will settle the tax relief.
- the invoice is returned to the Italian retailer within four months after the purchase was made. If the invoice is stamped by other EU countries, it needs to be brought to the shop retailer by the fourth month following that of the purchase.
- 4. The goods purchased and the relevant invoice must be shown at the customs exit point when leaving EU territory (if you intend to pack the purchased items into your check-in luggage, you must go to Customs BEFORE checking in).
- 5. After leaving EU territory, the traveller must return the original invoice, regularly endorsed by the customs office, to the Italian retailer. Said invoice must be returned within four months from the date when the

- document was issued.
- 6. The refund can be made directly by the Italian retailer (however, make sure that the shop you've chosen displays a "Tax Free Shopping" or "Euro Tax Free" sign in its window).
- 7. Several Tax-Free companies are able to offer immediate VAT cash refunds when the goods leave either Italian or EU territory (thus exonerating the passenger from having to return the invoice to the retailer). However, this procedure only applies at major international airports or main border crossings. Most major department stores have Tax Free Refund
- 8. The services provided by Tax-Free companies imply the payment of a small administrative sum which is **directly deducted** from the amount of VAT refunded to the traveller.
- 9. In the event of a traveller not receiving a VAT refund within a reasonable period of time, he or she should recontact the Italian retailer or one of the aforementioned companies
- **10.** However, please note, VAT cannot be refunded directly by customs offices.

Verona flavours

It would be a pity to visit Verona without dedicating some time to the discovery of the local enogastronomical excellences, some of them are internationally known, others are more niche, but equally noteworthy.

AMARONE

This is a dry red raisin DOCG wine, produced exclusively in **Valpolicella**, a hilly area surrounding Verona and extending from Lake Garda to almost the border with the province of Vicenza. The climate and soil of this area, protected by the Lessini Mountains to the north and influenced by the almost Mediterranean climate, mild and not very rainy of Lake Garda, contribute to determine the organoleptic characteristics of this wine with its **full and velvety flavor**, which goes well with **full-bodied meat dishes**, such as braised meat, stews and roasts, but also with **cold cuts** and **hard cheeses**.



RISOTTO ALL'AMARONE

If you are true lovers of Amarone, you cannot avoid to taste a typical recipe where it is the protagonist together with another excellent product of the territory: **Vialone Nano rice**. This is the delicious **Risotto all'Amarone**, which you can obviously taste in the best restaurants of Verona.

MEAT-BASED MAIN COURSES

Rich stews served with polenta are also a feature of Veronese cuisine, such as brasato all'Amarone (beef braised in red wine) and pastissada de caval, a horse meat stew made rich with medieval spices.

MONTE VERONESE DOP CHEESE

Another traditional product of the area, which goes very well with Amarone and with the

other red wines of Valpolicella, is **Monte Veronese DOP cheese**, which was born in the mountains of Lessinia, paradise for lovers of **dairy products**: from butters, to caciotta cheeses, to various malga cheeses.

DESSERTS

As for desserts, Verona's most popular dish is **Pandoro**. Literally meaning "Pan de Oro" ('golden bread'), it is a sweet brioche-style cake dusted with icing sugar, with its typical eight-pointed star shape. Like the Milanese panettone, but much older, it has become an Italian staple for Christmas and New Year.

Another typical local cake is the **Torta Russa**, a pastry cake wrapped in a thick **almond paste**, so-called because its shape resembles that of a colbacco.

The pizza is prepared faithfully following the Neapolitan recipe. The **music brasserie** is in the cellars with a vaulted brick ceiling: a refined environment with a **magical atmosphere**, where you can listen to good music while enjoying delicious food and grilled meat. From aperitifs to after-dinner drinks, the bar offers a variety of speciality wines and spirits accompanied by imaginative snacks, bruschettas and platters of cold meats and cheeses. Live music three or four times a week, with a strong preference for jazz and blues.



On the trail of taste/1

A few kilometres north of Verona are famous wine-growing areas where many of the world's most exported Made in Italy wines are produced: these include the hilly area of Valpolicella, the kingdom of Amarone, Soave and Lessini Durello. The whole area deserves an itinerary to discover the most prestigious or characteristic wine cellars.





In Valpolicella and its surroundings

Set in the wonderful microcosm of the Valpantena, the valley closest to Verona and rich in numerous nature trails, Costa Arènte is located on a hill 250 metres above sea level The company produces wines with a strong Valpolicella identity, respecting the territory and tradition, but with a desire to innovate. 35 hectares of which 17 are planted with vines (corvina, corvinone and rondinella) and the remainder with woodland and olive groves. The grapes destined for Amarone, after being selected and harvested by hand, are put to rest in the "fruttaio", while the ageing phase takes place in a state-of-the-art "barricaia". Already a reference point in the valley as a refuge and favourite holiday resort for Veronese families, the estate opens its doors to visitors: from wine tasting to discovering the Costa Arènte vineyards and facilities. Soave, between tradition and quality

From a long family history, in the heart of the medieval town of Soave stands the Pieropan winery, where grapes and wines of excellence are produced. A great knowledge of the land and raw materials, combined with a great passion and a strong entrepreneurial spirit make this company a flagship in the Veneto region. The cultivation of the grapes, pressing, vinification and bottling all take place on site. 

Along the Veronese shores of Lake Garda, the three wine regions of Bardolino, Custoza and Lugana have in common the Garda terroir, which guarantees a moderate microclimate and altitude and a moraine soil rich in humus. Bardolino is a land of red and rosé wines, Custoza and Lugana of white wines, but all are distinguished by their freshness and ease of drinking.

Bike tour along the Mincio

A perfect itinerary for those who love to combine sport, nature, culture and wine and food experiences with **slow tourism**, between natural parks, botanical gardens and ancient castles: the **Mincio Valley cycle path** offers the possibility of organising a bicycle trip suitable for everyone.

On a city bike, or better still on a mountain bike, the section of cycle path from **Borghetto sul Mincio** to Peschiera del Garda is **15 km long** (the complete Garda-Mantova route is about 45 km long) through the green of the dense vegetation and the blue waters of the River Mincio. A flat route, on an asphalt road reserved for bicycles only, which crosses the protected area of the **Mincio Natural Park**, skirting the river in places, to arrive at the Unesco World Heritage fortress town of **Peschiera del Garda**. This is also the starting point for the 40 km Peschiera-Garda cycle path (round trip) along a picturesque route overlooking the lake.

Also called a theatre city, Vicenza preserves some of the most important artistic and architectural wonders of the Veneto region.

HITERTAINMEN

ast of Verona lies the city of Vicenza,
which bears innumerable traces
of Andrea Palladio, the architect
who influenced the design of the White
House in Washington DC. During the 16th
century, Palladio helped transform this city,
which is characterised by different styles:
Romanesque, Gothic, Renaissance, Baroque
and Neoclassical. Notable monuments include
the Teatro Olimpico, the Basilica Palladiana
and the Palazzo Chiericati.

The Teatro Olimpico is considered the oldest covered brick theatre in the world and hosts classical music festivals, Vicenza Jazz concerts and various other cultural events.

The Basilica Palladiana, the symbol of the city, leaves visitors speechless: it was Palladio who redesigned this building overlooking Piazza dei Signori, creating a style that combines

Today it houses the **Museo del Gioiello** with an innovative layout by designer Patricia Urquiola. There are many museums, gardens and monuments to see in Verona, including the Parco Querini, the Gallerie di Palazzo Thiene, the Santa Corona temple, Villa Guiccioli hosting the Museo del Risorgimento e della Resistenza, Giardini Salvi, the Palladio Museum and the Temple of San Lorenzo.

Finally, the Palazzo Leoni Montanari houses the Gallerie d'Italia, which collects works of 18th-century Venetian painting, together with the most important Italian collection of Russian icons.




OUT OF TOWN

A flower garden near Verona

The Parco Giardino Sigurtà, about 30 km from Verona, offers a spectacle of green spaces as far as the eye can see with amazing seasonal blooms. One of the highlights is the famous "Tulipanomania" between March and April, when hundreds of thousands of tutipaniums of all shades of colour bloom in unison. Then there is the "Avenue of Three Thousand Roses", which in May covers more than a kilometre of promenade. Also worth visiting are the "Labyrinth" of 1,500 yew trees that form a path over an area of 2,500 sq.m., the "Water Gardens" and the "Great Oak". Other places of interest are: the Castelletto, the Horizontal Sundial, the Stone of Youth and the Hermitage. A riot of greenery and ponds - in which hundreds of water lilies and lotus flowers, water hibiscuses and papyruses triumph in summer - where you can stroll and enjoy fantastic views, on foot or by electric golf-cart, panoramic train, electric shuttle or bicycle.

Mantua, a city shaped like a palazzo

Only 40 minutes from Verona, Mantua is a place that conveys the splendour of 16th-century courts. Originally an Etruscan settlement, it achieved its full splendour in Medieval times and, in particular, during the reign of the Gonzaga family, the Dukes of Mantua who conquered the city in 1328 and ruled benevolently until 1707. Important monuments including Palazzo Ducale, Palazzo del Podestà, Palazzo della Ragione and the churches

of San Lorenzo (the "Rotonda") and Santa Maria del Gradaro also date back to this period. In 2016, the city has been named Italian Capital of Culture.

The city offers evidence of its prestigious history and rich traditions

at every corner of its historic centre: **porticoes, small squares and courtyards**, enchanting places that convey the splendour of 16th-century courts. The 14th-century Castle of San Giorgio houses the most famous room in the entire Ducal Palace, the **Bridal Chamber**, frescoed between 1465 and 1474.





Custoza, mix of history and vineyards

Custoza is a **small Italian village**, 11 miles southwest of Verona, near Borghetto and **south of Lake Garda**. Here visitors can enjoy the countryside while sipping local wine or **rent bikes to explore the area** and see all the history that fills this town. **History dates back to the XIX century**, where the first and third Italian Wars of Independence took place in 1848 and 1866. The **Ossuary of Custoza** stands on the **Belvedere Hill** to honor the Italian and Austrian soldiers that were killed during the two wars. The monument is marked with a tall stone pillar that consists of three rooms on the inside. Visitors will find a chapel, a **crypt** which displays remains of Italian and Austrian soldiers, and a **gallery** where visitors can find a 360-degree view of the area

Along with the monument, **Custoza is known for its wine**. Due to the **climate and soil** in this area, wine is able to be produced locally, and has hints of salty and savory as well as a fresh acidity.

Lessinia, fully immersed in nature

Lessinia is a **plateau in the Vicentine Pre-Alps** located mostly in the province of Verona, a **perfect spot to relax** and be fully immersed in nature. The area is full of rich history and civilization since the earliest of times. It borders the Piccole Dolomiti range and **Monte Baldo**, making Lessinia full of **beautiful views, hiking trails** and much more.

The **National Park of Lessinia** is the place to visit: trails are spread out around the park, leading visitors to all the must-see attractions including **fossilized Bolca fish, waterfalls, caves, natural bridges, lakes, forests**, animals and more. Museums at the park also help to showcase the history found within the perimeter of the park.

Also within the mountains of Lessinia is where the **Monte**Veronese cheese is produced. There are a few types of Monte

Veronese cheese that have different aging times ranging from

25 years to one year and sometimes more.





Soave, the "Most Beautiful in Italy"

Soave is a village at the base of the Lessini Mountains that resembles a small medieval town due to the castle and architecture of the buildings. Soave was named the "Most Beautiful Village in Italy in 2022", a contest launched by Italy's national television group, in a programme dedicated to travel and tourism. The area offers visitors a variety of monuments worth visiting and vineyards that produce Soave white wine, which is known around the world.

The Castle of Soave sits on top of Mount Tenda and is considered a military artifact and one of the main monuments in Soave. Visitors can still get a full tour of the castle and view the panoramic views of the vineyards surrounding the castle. Other monuments include Piazza dell'Antenna, Porta Vicentina, Porta Aquila, Palazzo Scaligero del Capitano and Porta San Giorgio. This land is perfect for the vineyards which gives visitors the opportunity to enjoy beautiful views while drinking local wine.









A museum dedicated to engines

The Nicolis Museum is a cultural enterprise of excellence destined to make the Italian mechanical engineering manufacturing tradition known throughout the world.

amed after Veronese entrepreneur Luciano Nicolis, the Museo Nicolis dell'Auto, della Tecnica, della Meccanica is located in Villafranca di Verona and houses hundreds of perfectly functioning cars including rare examples produced from the early 20th century (such as the Bianchi C-20) onwards. A passion for cars and engines that has given rise to the Museum's collections on display today in 6000 sq.m. A multiplicity of examples that

recount not only the technical, mechanical and engineering advances of the time but also the impact of the automobile on the evolution of society.

These are the numbers: about 200 vintage cars, 120 bicycles, 105 motorbikes, 500 cameras, film cameras and movie cameras, 120 musical instruments and jukeboxes, 100 typewriters, small aircraft and flight instruments and combinations, a rare collection of about 100 Formula 1 racing and touring, grand touring and sports cars, a military area with relics from the First and Second World War, model cars, motorbikes and trains, a section dedicated to motorbike, car and aircraft engines and hundreds of works of human ingenuity. The exhibition area is flanked by a Congress Centre, the Idea Space, the Tourist Activities, the Historical Archive, the Education Section, the Library and one of the best-stocked **Bookstore** on the world of engines.

GAM | Galleria d'Arte Moderna Achille

Forti – GAM was founded by Veronese patron Achille Forti, who at the beginning of the 20th century left his art collection as a fund for the establishment of a city museum dedicated to the arts. This heritage has been enriched through bequests and donations until there are about 1,600 works of art, covering a period of time from the early nineteenth century to the present day. It is currently housed in the Palazzo della Ragione and at the end of 2021 it inaugurated a new exhibition itinerary, the result of artistic research aimed at modernity: an exhibition structured according to the formula of the rotation of works, which aims to make known most of the works kept in the deposits, some of which have never been exhibited. Museo Archeologico al Teatro Romano –

The Archaeological Museum at the Roman Theatre is located in one of the most scenic areas of Verona, as well as being interesting from an archaeological point of view. During renovation work during the 19th and early 20th centuries, parts of the theatre were discovered: in particular, the cavity, dug into the hillside by the Romans to prevent water infiltration into the building, was discovered. The Archaeological Museum exhibits sculptural and decorative elements from the theatre pieces of mosaics tombstones stelae and altars, various epigraphs and statues. Open Tues-Sun, 10am-6pm. Museo degli Affreschi G.B. Cavalcaselle

- Dedicated to a famous historian and art critic of the 19th century, the museum houses frescoes painted between the 10th and 16th centuries, detached from private Veronese palaces and religious buildings to be rescued after the damage caused by the flooding of the Adige in 1882. It has recently been restored and enlarged with other collections, including sculptures made in the 19th century by Innocenzo Fraccaroli and Torquato della Torre, many paintings by artists who lived between the 16th and 18th centuries, and the frescoes recovered from the Grotta dei Santi Nazaro e Celso, one of the oldest sacellums in the Veronese territory. Museo di Castelvecchio – 29 exhibition halls with paintings, sculptures, archaeological finds and weapons; 622 works of medieval, renaissance and modern art on display; 90,000 medals and 10,000 prints, drawings and photographic plates; over 4.000 items in storage. These are the numbers of the collection of the Museo di Castelvecchio, one of the most important museums in the city dedicated above all to Italian and European art within the complex of the Scaligera fortress of Castelvecchio. Museo di Storia Naturale – The Palazzo Pompei houses scientific material dating back almost five centuries, studied and catalogued by naturalists and experts in 16 rooms: it is estimated to contain over 2 million exhibits. The Palazzo houses the sections devoted to minerals and rocks, palaeontology and zoology, while the prehistory and botany sections have been transferred to the Palazzina Comando of the former Austrian Military Arsenal. The jewel in the museum's crown is the section dedicated to the fossils of Bolca: over 250 animal and 200 plant species from the Lessini mountains, a few kilometres from Verona, over 50 million years ago. An extremely rare specimen of a large marine tortoise from the Upper Cretaceous period (around 70 million years ago) is also preserved here in excellent condition. Open Tues-Sun, 10am-6pm. Palazzo Maffei Casa Museo – Five centuries of history for an exhibition of ancient and modern art, with more than 350 works, including almost 200 paintings, about twenty sculptures, drawings and an important selection of applied art objects. In one of Verona's most scenic 17th-century buildings, twenty rooms decorated with stuccoes and frescoes overlooking Piazza Erbe make an elegant domestic setting into a wunderkammer that is a synthesis of the arts. The great passion for Futurism and Metaphysics gives collectors the opportunity to display unique masterpieces by Balla, Boccioni, Severini, but also Picasso, Magritte, Duchamp and other important artists of the last century. Giulietta between legend and reality

The universal fame of Romeo and Juliet stems from a 16th century novella set in Verona, inspired by Dante's "Divine Comedy" and the story of the Montague and Capulet families. The story reached England at the end of the 16th century and was staged by William Shakespeare, whose immortal verses made the two **unfortunate lovers** universally famous. In the eighteenth century, European travellers on the Grand Tour went to visit Juliet's tomb and would later attribute to her a home in this place where, from the balcony, according to tradition Juliet would look out to talk to her Romeo. Open to the public since 1973, after numerous restorations, Juliet's House has become a **house-museum** and one of the most important tourist attractions in the city, giving it the reputation of the "city of love". Don't miss a souvenir photo next to the bronze statue of the heroine, better still if touching her right breast for good luck.

ituated on the banks of the river Adige in the north-eastern **Veneto region**, Verona is Italy's second most well-preserved Roman city after Rome. In fact, if you want to take a step back in time, all you have to do is get lost among the arches of the Arena, the Roman amphitheatre and temple of international opera, walk among the almost intact steps of the Roman Theatre, which is still used today for shows and performances, or walk on the Ponte Pietra, built by the Romans around the first

What makes this city - which was Roman, Gothic, Byzantine, Lombard, Scaligera, Visconti and **finally Venetian** - unique is the harmonious combination of all these dominations. Declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO,

the historic centre of Verona boasts countless monuments and attractions not to be missed, such as Juliet's house, one of the most visited sites in Italy, and the medieval Piazza delle Erbe, the city's "living room", and then Castelvecchio, an imposing military fortification.

Verona is also the romantic city par excellence, where the timeless love story of Romeo and Juliet is set, where you can stroll through the streets of the centre in a **charming** atmosphere or where you can indulge in the best of local cuisine after attending an evening And if all these marvels are not enough for you,

you should know that Verona is surrounded by territories of great cultural and gastronomic interest, such as Valpolicella, an area of hills covered with vineyards, where the famous Amarone wine is produced, and **Lessinia**, with its rich environmental and natural heritage. Finally, with regard to excellence linked to wine, Verona's pride is its participation as the Italian

representative in the international network "Great Wine Capitals", which brings together 11 major cities and wine-growing regions around the world. And it will be Verona itself that will host the network's great Annual Meeting in 2024 on the occasion of the "Best of Wine Tourism" award (www.greatwinecapitals.com).

Purchase your ticket before you get on the **bus or the tram**. Buses run approximately from 5 a.m. to midnight. Tickets can be purchased online via the Ticket Bus Verona app, or at the ATV Office (Piazza Renato Simoni, 12) or at an authorised retailer (tobacconists, newsagents, LA.T.) and last 90 minutes from the first validation. There are also day tickets, which can be used until midnight on the day they are validated, or **10-trip carnets** which save money compared to a single trip.

It is also possible to travel around the city by bicycle using one of the many bike, e-bike and kick-scooter rentals (see also bikeverona.it).

• ZTL information – The majority of the city centre is a restricted traffic area ("ZTL-Zona a Traffico Limitato") closed to normal vehicles apart from residents and hotel quests.

If you are coming to Verona by car, you can opt to park your vehicle in a covered car park, where charges apply, close to the city centre. Or there are **free car parks**, a little further from the city centre but connected by buses to the centre.

• From the Valerio Catullo Airport to the city centre – The airport is only 12 kilometres from Verona. An **Airlink transfer** will get you to Verona Porta Nuova train station in about 20 minutes for only 6 euros; alternatively you can choose to take one of the taxis always available at the arrivals.




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
